# **Stewardship News**

The importance of the church's need for Stewardship lives with us year-round. As tax season approaches, for retirement age members there exists a pledge payment option of making a pledge payment by means of a Qualified Charitable Distribution from a traditional IRA provides a potential tax advantage than a cash donation.

Charitable minded individuals and couples have a tax smart strategy available to them with traditional IRAs: the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), also known as a charitable IRA rollover. The QCD allows a donor to instruct a traditional IRA administrator to send up to \$100,000 per year.

For those of age 73 years and older, IRS rules require an annual minimum distribution (RMD) from their traditional IRA. The RMD is taxable, however the taxable amount can be offset by making charitable contributions (QCD) directly from the IRA. The financial institution administering the IRA makes the payment(s) directly to the charitable organization(s) at the direction of the IRA owner. Depending upon income, this strategy combined with taking the standard deduction on one's annual tax filing can provide a significant tax advantage. By having IRA assets go directly to charity, donors don't report the QCD as taxable income and don't owe any taxes on the QCD depending on your tax situation. Pledge payments to our church can be made using this method of QCD. Many of our older church members are already taking advantage of this means when making their charitable donation.
